“ Just learned of Johnny Frank’s death. Have lots of memories as we grew through school. One comes to mind. We both built a small “motor bike”, one each, for a science project. We “gained” access to the manufacturing shop at Taylor Machine Works, at night, while a small night shift was working. Certainly this would not happen today, no way. He was always “mechanically minded”. Here we were as teenagers in this large manufacturing facility, even at that time, 1962-63, using brake presses, drill presses, welders, etc. We scavenged some parts from the old “Pasture Dream” and modified two bicycle frames too accept small engines. At the time, I did not realize how unusual this experience was. We were careful in our use of the machines and there was no hurt or harm too us or the machinery. We had “permission” too be there, but the small crew that was there did not appreciate our presence. Mr. Earnest White had given us permission. Although we did not interfere with their work, I assume we were given space by them because of Mr. Junior being on the payroll. Johnny Frank was “unique”, as we all are, but I still “appreciate” him and having known him.
